Curriculum Update from Mr Pearce:

At HVS we are always striving to ensure that all our pupils receive the best Curriculum offer available to them. September 2025 is no different, with Curriculum Leaders and teachers having once again worked hard to adapt and develop their subjects to make them more engaging, practical and enjoyable learning experiences. We are also pleased to announce that we will be introducing two new subject curriculums for the next academic year which are, Digital Skills and SPHERE+.

Digital Skills is a direct replacement for the subject formerly known as ICT. This new curriculum will encompass all that the ICT curriculum did before it but has been redesigned and reimagined to include more hands-on and contextualised experiences which will develop digital knowledge and skills which are essential for success in the modern era, in life, further education and the workplace. This newly formed subject has the potential to lead to both ELC & FS qualifications in Digital Functional Skills, with hopefully new and improved outcomes for our pupils.

SPHERE+ (Social, Personal, Health, Economic, Relationships, Employability with Life Skills) is another redesigned and reimagined curriculum which will encompass all that the PSHE & Life Skills Curriculum subjects did before it. Again, this change has been brought about to teach both subjects simultaneously, thus contextualising the learning and making it more practical to develop well rounded and more prepared young people for the next stage in their lives, education and workplaces. Junior Duke and Senior Duke (not to be confused with the Duke of Edinburgh award) will be awarded at varying stages following successful engagement and completion, with more exciting and diverse training, development and qualification opportunities being sought too.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all pupils on their achievements this year, both inside and outside of the classroom. A special congratulations must also go to our 2025 leavers for their engagement in their most recent examinations, and all their achievements and developments from over the course of their time spent with us. I wish you all the very best for the future.

We were analysing the authors use of language. In term 6 they have been looking at unseen extracts and learning to write PETER paragraphs in preparation for FS / GCSE style responses.

visited the Faculty of Mathematics at the University of Kent, as part of the "Stats Gone Wild" event. This gave the pupils an opportunity to spend the day as a Mathematics student, having sessions in the lecture theatres and seminar rooms that the university students use daily. The subject matter (the link between Ecology and Mathematics) did not phase our pupils, and although the tasks were tricky, they all completed them successfully. Badgers have been busy over the past two terms. In maths we have been learning all about time, measurement and fractions. We thoroughly enjoyed reading Roald Dahl's 'The Twits' and completing some fun activities in English and this term we have been exploring the works of AA Milne and reading Winnie the Pooh stories which everyone has loved! In Science, we have been learning all about plants and had a great time visiting Badgers Hill Farm. We were able to look in detail at lots of plants in the garden centre and we even saw some pollinators at work! We visited the various animals, and the pupils even had time to play in the park and choose a treat from the cafe. This term, we have been focusing on forces and magnets which has led to many experiments and investigations. The pupils also enjoyed exploring Wildwood this term and had great fun looking at all the amazing animals.

Pupils in **Rabbits** have continued to work hard in all curricular, areas in preparation for their transition to the Upper School. In Maths, we have been looking at statistics, perimeter, area, shape, position, direction and negative numbers. In English, we explored different poetry styles and worked on up-levelling writing with description. Our Science topic, Adaptation and Evolution, culminated in a fantastic trip to Port Lympne. The sun shone and we had a wonderful day admiring all the animals. In Art, to further enrich our science studies, we have created pictures of animals and their habitats and used charcoal to sketch fossils. Whilst looking at a wide variety of significant historical events, during our history topic 'Journeys', pupils found out about the brave children who were involved in the Kindertransport and the courageous passengers of the Empire Windrush.

This term in **Squirrels**, the pupils have enjoyed a variety of lessons and experiences. In science, we have been learning how to plot scientific data and planning fair tests for experiments. In English, we have had great fun studying Roald Dahl's stories, reading aloud, describing different characters and comparing them. In maths, we have been learning about time and money. The pupils have enjoyed studying analogue and digital time as well as roman numerals. A highlight of this term was the trip to Wildwood which the pupils absolutely loved!

Adventurers it has been a fantastic year in Adventurers Class! This term pupils have practised telling the time using analogue, digital clocks and ones with Roman numerals. We have been studying A.A Milne, particularly using our analytical and inference skills to work out character feelings and the author's choice of plots that happen in Winnie the Pooh. Pupils have also studied the features of Poetry. Adventurers had a fantastic day at Samphire Hoe to study habitats and classify creatures into groups based on their features. They enjoyed pond dipping and even spotted the exoskeletons that dragonflies had left behind! During our PSHE and Life Skills sessions, pupils have learned about changes that happen during puberty and how to keep their bodies clean and healthy.





<u>Discoverers</u> have had a fantastic term learning about poetry in English. We have been very creative making poems about Hundred Acres wood. In our Math's we have been learning about position and direction and shape. In Life skills we have chosen jobs and begun to understand about budgeting, allocating different amounts of our monthly pay to them. Finally, Discoverers have very much enjoyed Sports fest and their school trip to the RAF museum which was linked our V.E Day topic.
